Heatstroke in Dogs

These are the signs of heat stroke:

- · Shallow breathing
- · Heavy panting
- · Rapid pulse
- · The heart is racing
- · Body temperature increased (above 40°c)
- · Deep red tongue
- · Glassy look
- · Ears (inner side) hot and red
- · Exhaustion
- \cdot Cramps
- · Vomit
- · Diarrhea
- · Disorders of consciousness
- · Balance disorders
- · Tumbling
- · Apathy
- · Unconsciousness

First aid measures:

- · Move the animal to shade and a cooler environment.
- · Offer the dog water, but never force the liquid.
- · Cool the head and neck and place the animal on a damp towel.
- · Slowly wet your legs, starting from the bottom.
- · If possible, shower the animal carefully, starting from the bottom of the legs.
- · If the dog is unconscious, place it on its right side and stretch its head and neck so that the animal does not choke on its tongue.

MUST NOTE:

- · Under no circumstances should you pour water over the dog as there is a risk of shock!
- · Never use ice-cold water, there is a danger to life!
